Open Source Collaboration



The Hyperledger technical community is 100% open.

It is never pay-to-play with Hyperledger's blockchain technologies. You can participate as an individual, an employee of a company that is not a member, or as a corporate member. Our collaborative software development approach ensures the transparency and longevity required to bring blockchain forward to commercial adoption.

Hyperledger is led by a diverse group of technical contributors.

Send your developers! Anyone is welcome to participate and contribute to Hyperledger codebases, regardless of corporate membership status. Governed by technical meritocracy, Hyperledger is vendor-neutral. Contributions undergo a rigorous peer review process, but are welcome from anyone.







You can **shape the direction** of the project to fit your needs and use cases





Decrease time to market and accelerate the work of the project and what you want sooner





"With enough eyes all bugs are shallow" - leverage the community to fix your bugs






You will **learn a lot** from interacting with other community members

If you haven't been involved in an open source project before it can be intimidating to start participating.

Here are some tips for how to get comfortable:



Feel free to lurk

Seeing how other community members interact will help you adjust and learn the social norms in the community



Don't wait for an invitation

Our tools and meetings are open by default, so jump in and introduce yourself, ask questions and share ideas



Read our Code of Conduct

We've set and enforce high standards of professional practice from everyone you'll be meeting



The <u>Hyperledger Fabric Documentation Working Group</u> has started working with community members to translate documentation into more languages.

Fabric docs were previously available in <u>English</u> & <u>Chinese</u> and now translations have started for <u>Portuguese</u>, <u>Japanese</u>, <u>Malayalam</u>, <u>Spanish</u>, <u>French and more</u>.

This will make information about Fabric available to *more than* 1 billion people who speak those languages.

Special Interest Groups (SIGs)

Special Interest Groups are places where people collaborate to address common challenges across a range of different industries.

Here are some examples of what the community has built together.







The Telecom SIG has published papers about using blockchain for IoT and settlement use cases

The Climate Action and Accounting SIG is developing an open source blockchain based carbon accounting tool The Healthcare SIG has regular guest speakers share about their work to educate people about best practices and lessons learned







Special Interest Groups (SIGs)

SIGs are industry specific groups of community members working together to help drive adoption of Hyperledger.

Working Groups (WGs)

WGs are focused on building community around different technical challenges faced by the Hyperledger community

All WGs are open and you are welcome to join one by:

- Subscribe to the group's mailing list or chat channel and introduce yourself
- Dial-in to an upcoming meeting to take part in discussions and share what you're doing
- Add your name to the group's member directory so people can connect with you

Becoming a Project Maintainer

You can help set the direction and future of any of the https://www.hyperledger.google.com by taking a leadership position

By contributing to a project over time with high quality contributions, you may become a maintainer (get a commit bit)



The process differs from project to project so check documentation for the project you're interested in



Becoming a TSC Member

The main technical governing body in the community is composed of active contributors who are elected yearly to the <u>Technical Steering Committee</u>

Anyone in the technical community that contributes code, documentation or other technical artifacts is eligible to run and vote

Keep an eye on the <u>TSC mailing list</u> and their <u>regular calls</u> to learn more about the nomination and voting process





Becoming a Group Chair

Our <u>Special Interest Groups</u> and <u>Working Groups</u> are led by community member Chairs

There are opportunities to become a Chair of an existing group when the current Chair steps down or when the group holds an election



You can also become a Chair of a new group by going through the process of proposing and starting a SIG or WG



Becoming a Leader in Your Local Community

There are also opportunities to lead and grow the local Hyperledger community in the area where you live

You can start or join a <u>Hyperledger meetup group</u> in the city where you live and become an organizer and run events and activities

You can lead a <u>regional Chapter</u> to bring people together based on a shared geography or shared language
